Conference 2007 Ambles Forward

Conference planner hired! Committees set up and staffed! Partnership with Citrus County FNPS chapter established! And by the time you read this, conference site booked! Thanks to all the people who have been working so hard for the initial planning.

The conference is really taking shape. We've got a tentative date: May 17-21, 2007. As long as there are conference venues we can book for that time, we're planning on that. A solid core of people have come forward to volunteer for committees. One change we've made from previous conferences – we hired a professional conference planner. Past FNPS conferences have been run by a mix of local chapter volunteers, staff from the state organization, and sometimes by part-time people hired locally.

There was quite a bit of debate about hiring a professional planner because of the cost. After looking at a number of bids we ended up hiring a local company, The Planning Connection (planningconnection.com). Planning Connection is run by Jackie Cassarly. We basically hired her to be our grown-up. Chapter members are responsible for providing enthusiasm, native plant knowledge, grunt labor, and cash if necessary. Jackie will help provide structure to our enthusiasm, and use her experience with negotiating venue contracts, registration web-sites, conference budgets, and time-line management, to focus us on a better conference.

What can you do to help, native plant enthusiast?

1 - Go to the FNPS conference in Daytona, "Growing Partnerships: Preserving

Florida's Environment from Backyards to Backwoods". The whole conference happens between May 17 and 21, but you can pop down for a Saturday. Details are on the website: fnps.org.

- 2 Help us come up with a theme. My suggestion "Eco-Freako's in the Yard" was shot down by the conference committee. I know you can do better. If you have a theme idea, email it to me (charliepedersen@gmail.com). Speaker suggestions and field trip suggestions are also welcome.
- 3 When the conference comes to town, come to the conference. Set May 17 20 2007 aside on your calendar. Even if you can only come down Saturday morning, I guarantee you will learn something great, or better yet, teach something great about native plants.
- 4 When the conference comes to town, bring someone to the conference. We're doing all this work, hoping for outreach. So, Reach Out.
- 5 Volunteer. The conference committees and volunteers so far are listed on the (page 5). If something appeals to you, contact me or the committee chair. One particular need a chair for the publicity committee. This individual would be involved with writing and laying out our printed material, and reaching out to the media for public relations and ads.

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River Rally Report

The 2006 "Rally for the River" was an unmitigated success! River Front Park in Palatka was in full Festive swing with over a hundred vendors. Everywhere crafts and colors, food and music, and smiling faces. A couple "Save the Rodman" banners were displayed outside the park, maybe next year we can counter them with "Rally..." banners.

The Issue: removal of the dam at Rodman Reservoir and restoration of the free-flowing Ocklawaha River. As a major tributary to the St. John's River, restoration of the Ocklawaha would be ecologically beneficial for the entire region. The purpose of the Rally is to demonstrate the economic benefits to regional businesses. Saturday morning Angel's Restaurant on Highway 17/100 was packed with Rally participants.

Dozens of outings and programs were presented, most by volunteers, to inform participants on the cause. I (Karen Garren) led two hikes. Mushroom ID 101 was on Saturday at Mud Springs Trail of Welatka State Forest. We did not expect to find many fungal fruit this time of year and so were not surprised. Although what we did enjoy was good camaraderie, a beautiful picnic site, and various animal tracks. Mushrooms found were: many *Laccaria*, some lovely *Russula*, a few *Lecinum*, and dozens of interesting polypores.

For our hike on Sunday on the Ocala National Scenic Trail, it was cool and breezy but we were well sheltered in the scrub. We hiked 7 miles from the reservoir to Lake Delancy. We discussed the plant and soil characteristics of these dense scrub ecosystems, stressing the importance of ephemeral ponds to herpitalfauna wildlife and were entertained by lively scrub jays. We found bear scat in the trail and found snags raked for grubs six feet up. Off road-vehicle and ATVs illegally use the hiking trails, doing much damage. As we passed through lovely long leaf pine savannahs, we talked about the role of prescribed burns in maintaining these vanishing ecosystems, visiting gopher tortoise burrows, meeting a six-lined race-runner lizard, and hearing red-cockaded woodpeckers. An oak-canopied pond off FR 88 has a magical aspect. A good time was had by all.

Ocklawaha Rally

The day couldn't have been more beautiful as Jill McGuire and I set up the FNPS information table at the Ocklawaha River Rally on the banks of the St. John's River in Palatka. A light breeze from the water washed over us all day and a large oak tree sheltered us from the bright spring sun-

shine. Karen Ahlers and her volunteers had done a terrific job lining up vendors that were dotted along the river walk with a combination of environmental booths, arts and crafts, music and food. Our table was near native plant vendors Breezy Oaks Nursery and Natural Treasures Nursery who had brought early blooming native azaleas, Chickasaw plums and blue woodland phlox. The Rally had drawn folks from all over and we



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talked with people from Gainesville, Palatka, Jacksonville, St Johns, Putnum and Volusia counties. Some were familiar the FNPS and others were introduced to our group and invited to visit the FNPS website for learning more about native plants and where to find them. We talked about plants in people's yards, about plants they remembered while growing up in Florida and about their feelings for the Ocklawaha and other rivers of this area. Jill discussed the evils of using cypress mulch in landscapes and the devastation of our cypress forests. People shared stories of their never-ending job of removing exotic pest plants from their yards. In the afternoon, people who had taken field trips came by to enjoy food and music and talk about plants they had encountered. There seemed to be an interest among the Jacksonville people to start their own group and we encouraged them to pursue that by contacting state FNPS, local Master gardeners and their local nurseries. Thanks also to David Pais and Erick Smith for spending their afternoon at the table. This rally is an annual event sponsored by the Environmental Council of Putnum County (ECPC) to bring awareness of conserving natural areas, and of course to remove the Rodman Dam. Consider supporting this event next year by attending some of the many activities.

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
